# MESSIAH

This, Handel's greatest masterpiece, is once again being performed to-day so that we can join in paying homage to this great composer, who although German born, and never really mastering the English language, left such an indelible mark on the English musical life of his time, and all time, that it will surely never be erased. Handel's output was enormous; operas, anthems, concertos, and all types of music poured from his pen during his lifetime, but he is remembered more for his oratorios (of which form he was the originator) than the rest. Of these, **Messiah** has never lost its great appeal, and now 200 years after his death it is more frequently performed than any other comparable work, although, let it be said, not always as well as the superb music demands. Far too many singers are apt to say that they *know* **Messiah**; but how many really do, or ever will? Description of the work itself would be impossible unless one had many pages available, and many great writers and musicians have endeavoured to accomplish such a task, with varying success. Suffice it to say that the music so vividly portrays the life of Jesus Christ and His triumph over sin and death, brought to a climax in Handel's greatest chorus 'WORTHY IS THE LAMB THAT WAS SLAIN', that one understands what Sir Malcolm Sargent means, when he says, that if granted one more wish before his death it would be 'to conduct just one more performance of **Messiah**'.

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**Thelma Godfrey** has performed with the Society on two previous occasions, at East Grinstead three years ago, and also in 'Elijah' at St. John's Church, Tunbridge Wells, just a year since. She has always delighted our audiences with her splendid singing and charming personality; we welcome her again and look forward to a fine performance.

**Caroline Foster** makes the long journey to-day from Manchester because when the Society was taking part in a Festival performance of 'Elijah' in Canterbury Cathedral last year we considered this young contralto the outstanding soloist in the performance, and invited her to be with us to-day. We hope she will take back happy memories of a southern **Messiah**, since she comes from the North, where they know something about this work!

**Duncan Robertson** comes from Scotland, and we are very pleased to welcome him to Tunbridge Wells. He has had great success in important roles at Glyndebourne during the Summer, and in the opinion of many good judges is a young tenor of great potential. Since Glyndebourne he has broadcast for the B.B.C. in several important choral and operatic works, including Oedipus Rex on Monday last, conducted by Stravinsky.

**Richard Standen** is a well established and distinguished oratorio singer, who last appeared here in 1950. It has been too long since we heard him in Tunbridge Wells and we extend a most warm welcome to him on his return.

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Our thanks are due to Mr. Ronald Good for leading the Orchestra once again, and for engaging distinguished professional players; to Mrs. Dorothy Berry for rehearsing the local orchestral players, and to those members of the Royal Tunbridge Wells Symphony Orchestra who have, as always, readily agreed to play for us.
