By 1867 his health had deteriorated and in November 1868 he had to undergo an operation from which he did not recover. He died at his villa in Passy on the 13th November, 1868.

It is a sequence (i.e. Hymn in irregular metre) for the feast of the Seven Sorrows of Our Lady and also accompanies the devotion of the Stations of the Cross, practised by Roman Catholics and many others. It is usually ascribed to Jacopone Da Todi, a 13th-century Franciscan Friar.

Rossini's setting is perhaps the most famous of the many in existence, but its operatic nature, though a *tour de force*, is a world removed from the austere plainsong to which it is usually sung on religious occasions.

Bruckner's Mass No. 3 in F minor is the last of his three settings of the Mass, and has come to be called his Missa Solennis. The work occupies a key position in Bruckner's development and dates from 1867-68 when he gave up his position as organist at Linz Cathedral. It is fully scored for four soloists, chorus (which has no rest in the whole work!!) and orchestra, and is a heaven-storming work which has its place both in the Church and the Concert Hall.

This is the first time, so far as can be traced, that a major work of Bruckner's has been performed here, and our thanks are due to Mr. Trevor Harvey for his painstaking rehearsal and enthusiastic championship of this composer.
