

Bach, Mass in B Minor

The Great Mass in B Minor originated as a Lutheran Mass, Kyrie and Gloria, which Bach wrote in 1733 and sent to the King of Saxony with a humble request for patronage. The other movements making it a full-length Mass suitable for Roman use were added later, being mostly adaptations from earlier Church Cantatas. In it two long lines of development reach their culminating point simultaneously. Musically, Bach is the supreme composer at the time when the rather chaotic experiments of the Seventeenth Century came together to form the classical style of the High Baroque, before music collapsed into rococo trivialities and romantic extravagancies.

From the liturgical point of view, although the Mass had reached stability as an art-form in the Sixteenth Century, it was not until Bach's time that composers developed the musical forms and techniques needed to cope with the liturgical complexities. The new operatic style from Italy, fertilized by the sturdy traditional plainsong, gave exactly the variety of chorus and aria, strength and grace, masculinity and femininity, needed for the musical expression of the words. The genius of Bach did the rest, and his unerring interpretation of the verbal points of climax and repose in his musical setting makes the work supremely satisfying. His repetition of the Gratias Agimus in the final Dona Nobis is not mere laziness as some have suggested (how obtuse can you get?) but a rounded formal recapitulation. And this, though an apparently simple movement in four parts, is, with the subtlety of the counterpoint and exultation of trumpets, by no means the least impressive.

As far as Bach was concerned, the Mass had the desired effect.

The King gave himself time to finish a few wars and three years later graciously appointed Bach to be his Lord High Composer.

IAN THOMPSON is from Bradford and was Organ Scholar from 1967

RICHARD HICKOX. Since his London debut in 1971 Richard Hickox has been recognised as one of the most promising of Britain's young conductors.

He was born in 1948 and studied at the Royal Academy of Music before winning an Organ Scholarship to Queen's College Cambridge where he gained his Music degree. His musical career has included the founding of the Richard Hickox Singers and Orchestra; a complete performance of the Messiah at the Proms in 1973 and many BBC broadcasts. He has also conducted at several music festivals and has embarked on a series of gramophone recordings for a New York recording company.

WENDY EATHORNE. Miss Eathorne is a native of Cornwall and received her musical training at the Royal Academy of Music and has since given many performances throughout Europe and has sung at Glyndebourne, with the Welsh National Opera and Sadlers Wells Opera.

DOREEN WALKER. Born in Huddersfield, Miss Walker first studied music locally before winning an Open Scholarship to the Royal College of Music in 1966 where she was awarded many prizes and represented her College on numerous occasions. Since 1970 she has made many appearances in Opera, Oratorio and Recitals, all over the British Isles.

DISCOURSES LTD TUNBRIDGE WELLS IAN THOMPSON is from Bradford and was Organ Scholar from 1961 to 1964 at Queen's College Cambridge, after studying at the Royal College of Music. Later he was appointed Vicar Choral at St. Paul's Cathedral for five years and then studied Italian music in Italy and sang at Barga. In Britain his work has included Opera for All, Oratorio, Music Festivals, the Deller and Purcell Consorts and Pro Cantione Antigua.

RICHARD JACKSON began his musical career at 13 years of age when he took up the violin. In 1969 he became a Choral Scholar at King's College, Cambridge and in 1971 entered the Guildhall School of Music and Drama where he sang numerous roles and also took the part of Don Giovanni in a Geraint Evans BBC Television Master Class Programme. Richard Jackson has sung with the English Opera Group, the London Opera Centre and has made appearances at Sadler's Wells, Fairfield Hall, St. John's, Smith Square and the Queen Elizabeth Hall. He has also sung the works of Lully, Monteverdi and Purcell with the Cambridge University Purcell Society.
