audience was attracted to the beautiful grounds of Bredbury on Wednesday for the unique event of an open-air-rendering of the beautiful dratorio of "Elijah," by Mr. Francis Foote's Choir and Orchestra, in aid of our blinded heroes, at St. Dunstan's. Fortunately the weather was fine, and there was not too much rustling breeze in the sylvan surroundings to mar the piano passages, with the result that those present enjoyed a remarkable experiment in oratorio performances. The famous work is too familiar to call for detailed reference to the artistes, who admirably sustained the solo parts, and it will suffice to say that Miss Dorothy Richardson (sopreno), Miss Molly Curry (contralto), Mr. Gale Gardner (tenor) and Mr. Percival Driver (bass) successfully surmounted the difficulties of their auditorium, and were heard with most pleasing effect. The orchestra and chorus of nearly two hundred performers contributed largely to the success achieved. The experiment was a somewhat hazardous undertaking, and the uncertainty of the English climate, combined with the great difficulty of securing perfect musical cohesion and voice blending in the open-air will be factors which will assuredly prevent such performances becoming the fashion, as it were. But Wednesday's performance, nevertheless, is fully worthy of the most favourable commendation, and altogether it was a personal triumph for Mr. Foote, while the success generally reflects credit upon all concerned. Thanks are due to Mr. and Mrs. Duncanson for kindly throwing open the beautiful grounds.
