GEOFF STREDDER (d. 2003) AN APPRECIATION

When Helen MacNab asked me if I felt I could write a short account of Geoff's time with the RTWCS, I gave it considerable thought before finally agreeing. Here I should point out that such an appraisal must of its nature, be totally subjective. In the end it has proved for me, mostly a happy experience, which was quite a surprise.

Geoff's first association with the Society dates back some thirty-six years, which is a long time. We both responded to a Courier advert for members, and we went along to rehearsal then, as now, on a Monday evening. How many members presently remember the old Christ Church Hall in the High Street, a somewhat depressing venue thankfully changed a few years later to St John's Hall, lighter and brighter? Geoff thought carefully before accepting an invitation from Cyril Wood to step into his shoes as Secretary in 1973 when we returned from a tour of duty in Mauritius. He needed to satisfy himself that he would be capable of doing the job efficiently and happily. I don't think he needed to have had doubts. His own essentially optimistic, cheerful and positive attitude to life coupled with his emphasis on efficiency and a structured pattern in all his work influenced all that he

subsequently did as Secretary. Those who knew him well will not forget his friendliness, his own particular brand of quick wit and wry humour which invariably lightened a potentially difficult situation, whether in general rehearsal announcements, concert practices or on concert days themselves. This is not to say that he suffered fools gladly, nor was he often called upon to pour oil on troubled water!

Geoff saw two main areas where change was needed - firstly, he made a clear division between the organisation of orchestra and choir and took over that of the latter. He also clarified the work and fees of accompanist and conductor, not a totally popular move with everyone. But he was not to be moved. Secondly, in order to create a much warmer friendlier atmosphere among the membership he moved us on from an end-of-season glass of sherry standing up and instigated an end-of-season social gathering with refreshments and ad hoc entertainment. This has gone on from strength to strength under new leadership. How greatly Geoff enjoyed all the concerts and how much practice time he spent at the piano at home in order to be certain of his part and to be thoroughly prepared.

I notice that the Wiesbaden Choir is joining to sing in this, Derek's farewell concert. It was Geoff's foresight that forged the link with this choir when their Pastor first came to Vale Royal Church where Geoff met him. Also, Anthony Michaels-Moore is fulfilling a promise made to Geoff, that he would be happy to sing for the choir at some future date, when free to do so. And here he is!

Geoff never believed in clinging on to office if he felt no longer able to give his best. So in 1983 he resigned the Secretaryship, passing it on to Len Lee. In the 1990s he took up the reins again for a couple of years. Thereafter on concert days he took on the responsibility for looking after the soloists and ensuring that they appeared in the hall on time. Now somewhere "out there" Geoff and many other members no longer with us, are raising their voices with the angelic choir, singing maybeGerontius?

OUR FORTHCOMING SEASON

The first concert of our next season is on Sunday, 13th November at 3 pm in the Assembly Hall, Tunbridge Wells. This will be our first concert with our new Musical Director and we shall be giving a performance of Handel's Messiah - a work we have not performed for 12 years. It is a very popular work but however familiar it is to both singers and audiences there is always something special about each individual performance and we hope that many of you will come and enjoy it in November.

Are you a newcomer to singing who likes the idea of taking part in large choral works? Do you doubt your ability? Here is your chance to start with a work that is relatively familiar. Come and join us and see how much you enjoy it. We should love to have you. If you are a more experienced singer we should be delighted to see you too. No matter how many times you have sung *Messiah* there is always more to learn. And there is always someone in the audience who has never heard it before.
