## **Programme Notes**



## Hector Berlioz (1803-1869)

The Shepherds' Farewell from The Childhood of Christ (L'Enfance du Christ), Op. 25

*L'Enfance du Christ* is arguably Berlioz's most intimate and exquisitely sensitive work, but it was, in truth, sparked off by a party joke. At a card party, Berlioz was asked by a friend, the architect

Louis Duc, to write some music in his autograph album. He did so, and signed it with an imaginary composer's name similar to that of his friend, "*Pierre Ducre, Maitre de musique de la Sainte-Chapelle*". He had written the piece deliberately in an old-fashioned style and had dated it 1679. Towards the end of 1850 this short chorus was performed in public under the title "*The Shepherds' Farewell*". Both audience and critics found it delightful. (Berlioz, rather cynically, maintained that they would not have done so had they known it was his!)

Soon afterwards he added a 'little fugue' and a tenor solo to make up a complete cantata, "*The Flight into Egypt*". Two more cantatas were later added to make up the the complete oratorio of "*L'Enfance du Christ*" which was published in 1854.

## Benjamin Britten (1913-1976)

#### A Ceremony of Carols, Op. 28

A Ceremony of Carols (op. 28) was written by Benjamin Britten in March 1942, while at sea aboard the M.S. Axel Johnson. Originally written for Treble Choir and harp, the piece was first performed by the Morriston Boy Chorus, under the composer. Because of the immense popularity of the piece, the mixed chorus setting to be heard tonight was arranged by Julius Harrison at the request of the publishing house of Boosey and Hawkes. The texts, which



are reproduced below, are taken from a range of medieval and Renaissance poetry, and Britten's music also reflects the influence of earlier times.

The first two carols set 14th-century texts. The joyful cries of Wolcum Yole! contrast with the gentle setting of *There Is No Rose*, in which the repeated C/F bass ostinato in the harp only changes briefly to a long E flat at the third statement of the word *transeamus*. In the lullaby *Balulalow* the cross-rhythms of the harp accompaniment provide a continuous rocking motion for the cradle. The cold minor-key opening of *In freezing winter night* contrasts with the warmer major of the verse *This stable in a Prince's court.* Joyful shouts of *Deo gracias* introduce the final carol, and canonic entries of the same figure are used to create a tumultuous climax.

Four numbers will be omitted today: the opening Procession and closing Recession *Hodie*, which are specific for Christmas Day, *That yongë Child*, *This little Babe*, and the *Spring Carol*.

**The words of "A Ceremony of Carols"** are mostly of anonymous origin, but two numbers have named authors. The lullaby *Balulalow* was written by three brothers, well known 16th Century Scottish poets and ballad writers, while *In Freezing Winter Night* was penned by Robert Southwell, a Jesuit priest, also from the 16th century, who was hanged in 1597 but canonised by Pope Paul VI as one of the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales in 1970 - some 28 years after Britten set his words to music. The precise spelling of the old texts is open to argument, but it is understood Britten was relaxed about the variations of pronunciation heard in performances.

## J.S. Bach - Chorale Prelude: In Dulci Jubilo (BWV 729).

The *In Dulci Jubilo* melody can be traced back to the fourteenth century. From the sixteenth century it was incorporated into Lutheran Hymnals with its Christmas text, which is where Bach would have come across it. His chorale prelude for organ *In Dulci Jubilo* for sets out the chorale melody supported by block chordal harmony at the outset, and the phrases of the chorale are separated by improvisatory flourishes. As the



piece progresses, the decorative flourishes start to tangle with the chorale melody itself, creating an increasingly complex contrapuntal texture.

## The performers

#### Rebecca Miller - Conductor

Acclaimed by both press and audiences as a compelling, insightful and energetic force on the podium, Rebecca is at home in both the orchestral and choral worlds. As First Prize winner in the Eduardo Mata International Conducting Competition in Mexico City, she has guest conducted extensively in Mexico, including repeat performances with the National

Symphony of Mexico, the Orquesta Filarmonica del UNAM, among many others. In 2010, she completed a highly successful tenure as Resident Conductor of the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra, where she ran her own series, the *Casual Classics*, as well as conducted classical, community, education, and cross-cultural and cross-genre performances, and where she was particularly admired for her ability to communicate with audiences of all ages.

Among her guest conducting credits are performances with the Southbank Sinfonia, the Chicago College of the Performing Arts, the London Sinfonietta, the Reno Philharmonic, the Huntsville Symphony, the Orchestra of the Swan, and the Jerusalem Symphony. Rebecca's previous positions include being Conducting Fellow of the Houston Symphony, Assistant Conductor of the Jerusalem Symphony, Junior Fellow at the Royal College of Music, Music Director of the Kingston University Orchestra and Chorus, and Music Director of the Sine Nomine Singers. She has released two CDs with her critically-acclaimed orchestra, The New Professionals, the latter of which received an 'Outstanding Recording' award from International Record Review, and 'Recording of the Year' by MusicWeb International.

Rebecca comes from California and trained as a pianist and soprano at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music and at Northwestern University. She is currently based in London with her two children and her husband, the British pianist Danny Driver.

## Anna Wynne - harp

Anna Wynne studied at Birmingham and Leeds Universities, achieving a BA(hons) in English and Music, and an MMus in Performance.

Since completing her studies, Anna has embarked upon a busy freelance career both at home and abroad. Recent performances have included appearances at the Rye Festival as a member of the Sussex based Tilling Ensemble, plus performances of Britten's



A Ceremony of Carols at St Martins-in-the-Fields and Portsmouth Cathedral, Handel's Harp Concerto with the Voce Ensemble, Debussy's *Danses* at the Brighton Fringe Festival and Mozart's Flute and Harp Concerto on a number of occasions.

She made her Purcell Room and BBC Radio 3 debuts in 2004 in a Halloween concert at the Purcell Room with James Bowman, Peter Medhurst, Linda Howarth and Carol Wells. In addition she appeared with the film director Ken Russell in a recent BBC Television series "A Picture of Britain".

In recent years Anna has played with the Orquesta Sinfonica de Tenerife, Orquesta Filamonica de Gran Canaria, Britten-Pears Orchestra, and Southbank Sinfonia. Anna regularly performs at functions around the UK, and has played for the Prime Minister, Princess Anne, the Princess Royal, the Lord Mayor and the Mayor of London. Anna has performed several times for RTWCS, her last appearance being at our highly successful concert in the Tunbridge Wells Assembly hall in November 2013.



## The Wadhurst Brass Band

The present band owes its life to Algy Hoare, a local school teacher who formed a school band in 1957 and he and his players became great ambassadors for the school. Success led naturally into the "Youth Band" that evolved in 1974 into the "Wadhurst Brass Band" that we know today. Algy was awarded the British Empite Medal (BEM) earlier this year for his "services to music". The band developed a friendly and



welcoming style in which players both young and old were able to develop their musicianship.

The Wadhurst Brass Band is a group of friends, from all walks of life, who share a love of music-making and entertaining local communities. We continue to attract talented players and welcome players of all abilities. We are particularly proud of our growing training band "L-Plate" Brass. ## **Jeffrey Gray**

Jeffrey read Music at Magdalen College where he was a Choral Scholar, singing in the celebrated Chapel Choir. After leaving Oxford, he held teaching posts in Worcestershire and York before becoming Director of Music at Monmouth School. He worked there for eight successful years, not least with the school's choirs, which performed in collaboration with BBCNOW and Welsh National Opera and toured widely throughout Europe and in the USA.

After a short period as Director of Music at Caterham School, Jeffrey gave up full time teaching for a while and spent a time pursuing his interest in politics amongst other things. He now finds himself with a full teaching programme again. He teaches at The Kings School, Rochester, at Junior King's Canterbury and at Marlborough House. Jeffrey sings with Rochester Cathedral Choir and is the Musical Director of the Cranbrook Choral Society and the Organist of Goudhurst Parish Church. He also examines for the ABRSM.
